Tom Griffin, Playwright

Thomas E. Griffin, Jr. was born in Providence, Rhode Island on February 14, 1946. In 1969, he graduated with a B.A. in theatre from the University of Rhode Island and joined the Trinity Repertory Company shortly thereafter. While there, Griffin taught playwriting at the University of Rhode Island. He earned acclaim as a playwright when his play, The Taking Away of Little Willie, was performed at the 1979 Mark Taper Forum Playworks Festival, as well as Theatre Three in Dallas, Texas. A year later, his play, *Einstein and* the Polar Bear, was selected for the National Playwrights Conference. From there, the play was picked up by the Hartford Stage Company, and the work eventually found its way to the Cort Theatre on Broadway. Griffin, who died on March 20, 2018, is best known for his plays The Boys Next Door, Amateurs, Pasta, and Mrs. Sedgewick's Head.

Key Themes Found in The Boys Next Door


Humanity and Connection: The play emphasizes the fact that, despite differing abilities, everyone shares the fundamental desires for love, laughter, purpose, and belonging.

<u>Challenges and Triumphs of Individuals with Intellectual</u>

<u>Disabilities</u>: The play depicts the daily lives of men with various disabilities, highlighting their struggles and their moments of joy and success.

Societal Perceptions and Acceptance: The play shows how society views and treats individuals with disabilities, encouraging compassion and understanding.

Friendship and Community: The play showcases the importance of friendship and support within the group home, as well as in the broader community.
