Course Description:

History 1302 is a survey of United States History from Reconstruction to 1990. The course covers the industrial, social, cultural and political issues of the late nineteenth century as well as the emergence of the United States as a world power in the twentieth century.

Course Objectives and Student Learning Outcomes:

After successfully completing History 1302, students should have a working knowledge of the following:

- EXPLAIN the rise of big business and labor unions;
- ANALYZE the main reform movements of the 19th and 20th centuries;
- SUMMARIZE the causes and consequences of the major foreign wars of the 19th and 20th centuries;
- EVALUATE the principal changes in US foreign policy during this period;
- and
- EXAMINE the major social, cultural, and economic issues of the 19th and 20th centuries.
- Determine the cause and effects of the Cold War on the latter half of the 20th century.

Exams:

All exams, including the final, will be multiple choice. Exams will cover lecture material as well as the readings from the reader and the textbook. The final exam will be cumulative. Make-up exams will only be given in case of a valid absence and with permission of the instructor. Make-up exams will not be the same format/questions as the regular exam.

Papers:

Students must submit 3 TYPED papers over the assigned readings (250-500 words in 12 pt. Times New Roman, 1 inch margins, double spaced). Points will be deducted for incorrect format as well as for not being stapled. Papers should ANSWER the question posed by the assignment, SUMMARIZE the MAIN POINTS of the readings and give the student's REACTION to it. Papers will be due on respective due dates (as listed on the schedule below). See my website for grammar help. Use the following format:

Intro: 1 paragraph - introduce the topic, state the thesis (the answer to the question)
Body: 1-2 paragraphs - summarizing the main points that support the thesis
Conclusion: 1 paragraph - reactions, opinions, thoughts, arguments, etc.

Extra Credit:

Students may choose one or two films (if two, they must be about the same general thing; both Vietnam, both WWII, Civil Rights, etc.) from the provided list, view them and write a 2-3 pg. paper (12pt. Times New Roman, 1-inch margins) analyzing how that particular historical event or time period is portrayed in the film(s). Questions to help guide your paper are found beneath the movie list. If you want to do a movie that is not on the list you must get my permission first. Papers are worth up to 20 pts extra credit. **ONLY THOSE WHO HAVE TURNED IN ALL PREVIOUS ASSIGNMENTS MAY TURN IN EXTRA CREDIT.**
